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These profiles represent different segments of Germany society based on their attitudes towards Migration/Integration and Islam/Muslim communities. They were put together based on two sources:

- 1. More in Common Study (2019) Fault Lines: Germany's Invisible Divides / Die Andere Deutsche Teilung. URL: https://www.dieandereteilung.de
- 2. Polling data on German public attitudes to Migration, Muslims and Islam from a Swayable test¹ of JUMA campaign materials (commissioned as part of ICPA's Narrative Change Lab in 2019). Segmentation analysis of this data that inform these profiles was conducted by Dr. James Dennison (Migration Policy Centre) for ICPA in 2020.

While the studies both have sample sizes of around 4000 and were conducted in 2019 (although six months apart), they differ in focus and methods used: More in Common focuses on a broad range of issues (from migration to the environment) to understand the *political/psychological predispositions* of the German population. The Swayable data focuses on *specific attitudes towards migration, Muslims and Islam*. Layering the two studies makes the segments more functional for the purpose of RESET, with Swayable complementing More in Common's broader analysis. While this is certainly not gold standard from a research perspective, Dr James Dennison tested if the layering was methodologically sound enough and confirmed there was significant overlap. To be clear, we don't see them as a perfect fit, but as represented in the circles:



The original segment names from More in Common's study are used. To follow a pattern that has been helpful in our work to date, we have grouped and colour coded as follows:

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
